The post May 2016 year began very quietly with standard feral feeding and tracking at the various stations and homes. The usual July picnic at the gazebo was not held. We learned our able board member, Rich Kocher, would be leaving Dataw permanently in late winter. Thanks, Rich, for your service on the board.

Pool construction continued disrupting feeding at the tennis courts/pool feeder. We learned Slick relocated to the Odingsell Colony permanently and Peanut roves Locust Fence and back areas of ICE, while Mini remains loyal to the tennis feeder. Roberta has worked the newly purchased replacement motion sensor camera, which has given her fits: she retired from this task in early spring and we're reaching out for someone to take over camera duty. Through her efforts we learned Slick does make some night time appearances and, of course, so do raccoons, crows, squirrels, rabbits, and the occasional opossum. The feral count remained stable according to Dory and Pat.

This past fall Beaufort County Animal Shelter (BCAS) recogniized DIFF with an official Feral Cat colony permit. Stephanie Brumley presented the award in early fall. BCAS has identified, by GPS, all Dataw feral cat colony and feeding areas. In case of emergency, as with Matthew, BCAS employees deploy to colonies to ascertain cats are in good health and fed.

The annual board of directors meeting was held February 2. 2017. Board was elected and remain: Dale Martin , Executive Director; Pat Ashton, Co Executive Director; Tom Hurley, Treasurer; Roberta Gunderson, Secretary; Fred Houle, Head Trapper and Inventory Manager and Beverley Porter, Community Catliason. In May, Sandy Hatcher agreed to join the board at large. Roberta Gunderson proposed joining with Tabby House, as part of our outreach program for a joint benefit at the Community Center November 6. The proposal met with approval.

Again, Dory Ingram's Lucy and Roxy hosted our annual tea Febraury 16 at their lovely home. Louise Biedermann, a volunteer from Tabby House, as the guest speaker, filled us in on the role of volunteers at the facility. Attendees brought an incredible array of delectable appetizers. Susan Adams surprised Dory with a special thank you gift presented on a sled and unveiled by Bob Adams and Neville Patterson (see attached pictures of the tea; thank you Tom Hurley). Lively discussion abounded throughout the late afternoon gathering.
