## BARBARA ABASKA WITH DATAW ISLAND PASTRY CHEF ALLISON FONCEE

The year is 1867. Alaska has just been formally transferred to the United States through a treaty ratified by the U.S Senate (also known as The Alaska Purchase). \$7.2 million (about 2 cents per acre) was all it took to make Alaska the 49th state. What better way to celebrate this acquisition than by creating an enjoyable dessert in its honor? Enter: Baked Alaska. This land-deal-inspired dessert consists of ice cream and cake, topped with a meringue.

To give you a better understanding, I sat down with Dataw Island Pastry Chef, Allison Foncee, for a quick overview of how she has perfected this historical dessert.

Let's get to know Allison a bit better, first. Allison is a third-generation baker from Guatemala who moved to America when she was only eight years old. She was raised working in a bakery and wanted to keep the family tradition alive. At home, her two children, aged 2 and 4, can be found in the kitchen with their mom helping her out by licking the occasional spoon! Allison has spent the past five years crafting desserts and pastries that are not only delicious, but aesthetically pleasing as well. The last two years of her career were spent in Charleston perfecting her pastry work. Allison prides herself in her French pastry work as she acquired her skills from true Parisians.

We are so lucky to have such an accomplished pastry chef! Her favorite part of her job is making other



people happy with her work. If you haven't already, make sure you head over to The Pub to try out some of Allison's desserts!

Allison has recommended Baked Alaska for our "throwback" themed edition due to its simplicity and versatility. The basic ingredients are ice cream, cake, and meringue. The beauty of this dessert is that you can use a wide variety of flavors to make it uniquely your own. The goal is to have the cake warm, the ice cream cold and the meringue on top golden brown.

Here is Allison's suggested recipe for Baked Alaska.

#### You will need:

- 1 loaf of pound cake
- 8 cups of passion fruit gelato (or any ice cream/ gelato of your choice)
- 6 room temperature egg whites
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

#### Let's make it!

1. Line a 3 qt bowl with plastic wrap. Scoop the ice cream into the bowl ensuring to mix up the colors and press to remove any spaces.

2. Top with pound cake slices cutting to fit the bowl so the ice cream is covered. Gently press the cake into the softened ice cream. Cover well and freeze 3 hours.





3. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar with a mixer on high until foamy, about 3 minutes. Add sugar slowly and continue beating until stiff peaks form.

4. Remove plastic wrap and invert the cake onto a baking sheet. Cover or pipe with meringue. Place uncovered in the freezer for at least 1 hour or up to 24 hours.

5. Preheat oven to 500°F. Bake the dessert about 3-5 minutes or until meringue is golden OR torch meringue with a blowtorch until the peaks turn golden brown.

6. Allow to cool/rest 5 minutes before slicing, and enjoy.

Allison warned that the trickiest part of making this dessert is perfecting the meringue and deciding what flavor profile you want to go with! From the classic Neapolitan, to sorbet, the choices are endless! I am confident that the next time you come this dessert, across you will remember the significance it has in history.

## RENOVATE, RESTORE, AND RENEW DATAW ISLAND'S PAST, PRESENT & FUTURE

Over time, most things deteriorate or need a little sprucing up. Dataw Island is no exception. Whether it is a home or an amenity, renovations are a "must" to keep the island in tip-top shape for its current members as well as future members. Some things simply wear as they age (furniture, carpet), others reach the end of their useful lifespan (roofs, air conditioners, even roads!), and others must evolve as the population grows and/or its needs change.

Over the past 35+ years, the beauty of Dataw has remained steadfast due to the commitment of members and management to maintain the island's integrity. Certain areas of Dataw have gone through some major renovations to make it what it is today. What we now know as the Pub, was once the Ballroom! The Community Center was once a trailer, and the pool used to be square!

If you have been lucky enough to live here since the ALCOA days, you have seen a lot of changes on this island as it has evolved. If not, here is a little bit of history of the DIC and DIOA updates, major renovations,




#### and builds:

• Dataw Island was purchased by Alcoa in January 1983.

• The original portion of the clubhouse was completed in late 1984 along with the Cotton Dike course. Four Tennis courts were completed shortly thereafter. DIC opened for business in March 1985. The Clubhouse operation shared the building with the Alcoa sales team and Bluff Rental operations. The food & beverage venues were what is now the Tabby Room (upstairs) and the area that is now the Tide's Edge Grille (fine dining, downstairs). The section which is now the Jenkin's Creek Lounge and the Pub housed the Sales Department.

- 2002 Renovations to the Clubhouse are completed and include a new wing, the Carolina Ballroom.
- 2003 The Community Center is completed. Both golf courses are renovated.
- 2006, the current Tennis Center building was completed.
- 2010 Security Gates were installed
- 2011, golf course renovation (excluding the golf cart paths): Work began and the Cotton Dike course was completed in October and the Morgan River course was completed the following September.
- 2012, the DIC members voted on increasing the size of the Pub (informal dining) and decreasing the size of the Grille (formal dining).
- 2013 the DIC membership approved a renovation to the Tabby Room, lobby, and lobby bathrooms.
- 2015 A new resort-style pool opens
- 2016 History & Learning Center is built through DHF fundraising and volunteers
- 2018 Bocce Courts completed. Kayak storage and EZ-Launch are completed.
- 2019 Cart Path Renovation Completed
- 2019 Marina is purchased; Renovation completed in 2020.
- 2020 Dataw Island acquires Oak Island. The Carolina Ballroom is renovated. Pickleball courts are constructed.








From purchase of the island in 1983 to today, there have been many changes to Dataw Island and its amenities. The difference from then to now is unbelievable. We are a top community because of the renovations we have set forth and now Dataw Island is better than ever. This year alone we have completed a tee renovation project (making the courses more enjoyable and fair to all skill of players), unveiled the Carolina Ballroom Renovation, and are making some minor improvements to the Clubhouse to replace "wear and tear" items. Currently, committees are researching the plausibility of an expanded Community Center and increased dockage at the Marina. Whether these projects move forward now or in the future will be the decision of

the voting membership after surveys, focus groups and town halls send (or don't send) proposals to vote.

Many changes have taken place due to the commitment of members and management being dedicated to preserving the island for members now and in the future. Through all the changes, one thing has always remained the same – the beauty of Dataw Island.

## from Grand man to Ophella a Dataw Island Makeover

Converting this fireplace to a tabby and brick surround grounds it to the Lowcountry, and modernizing the look of "hard brick floors" (it was actually linoleum!) with wood warms the place up. The contrasting dark bookshelf is offset with light and airy furniture and accessories rooted in nature.





This bathroom was functional but filled with standard contractor-grade finishes, save for the upgraded soaker tub. In renovating, the view and natural light were maintained with a glass shower surround in this walk-in shower, complete with a built-in bench seat - affording style and accessibility. Natural finishes were again selected in a neutral pallette, highlighted by tile work.

The kitchen is, arguably, the heart of the home. While the original kitchen's layout was quite functional, the redesign aimed to make it more of a gathering place while making some major updates. Starting with the floors, a warm wood in a neutral dark tone was chosen to replace the linoleum. A new center island was created with storage and an intentional overhang suitable for bar stools. Vintage-feel open metal globe pendant lights draw focus to this area, and illuminate the kitchen in a warm alow. The island was surfaced with a granite that is also carried through to the counters, making the room more cohesive. Although two small overthe-hood cabinets were removed in exchange for an updated hood (that



is both functional and fashionable), additional storage was gained with new cabinets reaching to the ceiling. The cabinets in the renovated space are also all the same color, white, which creates a feel that the kitchen is larger than it is, since the space is not "chopped up" into layers like the old one.

This kitchen is now an inviting focal point and an attractive gathering place.

There are currently 9 homes on the market, 3 of which are under contract. Year to date, there have been at least 96 homes sold. There are 43 lots on the market, 2 of which are under contract. Year to date, there have been 30 lots closed.

Almost as fast as homes are listed for sale, they go under contract, although lately home sales are slowing a bit both here on Dataw and nationally, as the super-hot market is starting to cool.

This year, we have had 66 new listings come onto the market. Our absorption rate, defined as "how many months worth of inventory we have on the market" is just about one month, given that we have been averaging 12 home sales per month and have 9 homes currently listed.

As you can see, sales are outpacing listing activity. This is not exclusive to Dataw Island but is happening around the country; a related statistic heard on NPR recently was that there are currently more Realtors

than there are homes on the market! With supply falling short of demand, housing prices are rising. This is a cyclical phenomena that can benefit a savvy seller, but can also cause consternation when it's time for the buyer to eventually sell. In the housing bubble of 2006, prices ("values") were artificially inflated, and for many years to follow, many buyers who bought near the peak of the market were unable to sell, as they were underwater on their mortgages (that is, they owed more than they could sell for).

We hope not to see a repeat of this crash, and many analysts are promising we won't, as the sub-prime mortgage market took the blame; however, now we need to consider mortgage and rent forbearance to hypothesize the next big market moves.

One throwback we'd all like to avoid is a market meltdown. Home sales are slowing both here on Dataw and nationally, as the super-hot market is starting to cool, but hopefully this is a "market correction" and not a sign of things to come.

Over the years, many wedding traditions have transformed in different ways. One tradition that has held tried and true is the bride and groom first dance at their wedding. The first dance is one of the most common wedding traditions dating back to 17th-century Europe. This comes from a tradition from old-fashioned balls where the guest of honor (typically one whom holds the highest social power) would lead the first dance.

Members Lisa and Robert Tweardy (right) were married in 1988 and used the classic "Can't Help Falling in Love" song for their first dance. They chose the cover by Corey Hart. Years later when their daughter got married, it was time for her and her husband to have their first dance. When the music started to play, it was a familiar song. You guessed it! Much to their surprise, their daughter was also dancing to "Can't Help Falling in Love" for her first dance and used the 21 Pilots version.



Another set of members that were kind enough to share their first dance song with me were Linda and Frank Hager who danced to another classic during their wedding in 1964, "Daddy's Little Girl."

"Love, look what you've done to me, never thought I'd fall again so easily, oh love, you wouldn't lie to me, leading me to feel this way." Do you recognize



these lyrics? This is "Look What You've Done to Me" by Boz Scaggs. Patty and Scott Clark (below) shared their first dance together to this endearing song in 1987.



When I asked Linda Fiorella what she and her husband danced to at their wedding in 1971, she began to sing, "Longer than always is a long, long time, but far beyond forever you'll be mine, I know I never lived before and my heart is very sure, no one else could love you more." When I listened to this song known as "More" on YouTube, the comment section was filled with people expressing how they could not listen to the song without feeling emotional and that the lyrics express how it truly feels to be in love.

A classic jazz song that was written about merely enjoying the beauty of your surroundings makes for the perfect first dance song for two newlyweds. "What a Wonderful World" is a well-known song that was first recorded by Louis Armstrong in 1967. This song was topping charts in many countries around the world but didn't get the recognition it deserved in the United States until 1988 when it was re-released after appearing on "Good Morning, Vietnam." After this debut, the song rose to number 32 on the Billboard Hot 100 list! Maeneen and Jim Klein were a fan of the song before it became popular in the U.S and used it as their first dance song in 1970. What a wonderful world it is!




