

While it is a rare treat to see snow on Dataw Island, one Dataw member who is truly charmed by winter recently journeyed to a place he was SURE to see snow... No, not the North Pole – but Antarctica! Perhaps Earth's

most hostile climate, Antarctica is sparsely inhabited, but its few brave residents are truly beauties to behold. Antarctica is on the seven continents list, and it is usually the last to be visited.

Recently, Sanford "Sandy" Morse took a journey of nearly four days to get to 'The Ice' -- and the images he created are likely only trumped by his memories of this trip of a lifetime.

Aboard the National Geographic Explorer, Morse and just 60 other travelers accompanied about a dozen naturalists and photographers to the islands of the northern peninsula, twice making landings on the continent proper. The expedition was 21 days, first exploring Patagonia, and then crossing the infamous Drake Passage.

In addition to standard Arctic safety precautions, Covid





precautions added additional layers to the travel. "We were the first ship to visit Antarctica since Covid," Morse explained. "Because of Covid and governmental entanglements (ours, theirs, Chile and Argentina) it was 96 hours getting home and almost as long getting there. We stayed in a 'bubble,' with probably 10 Covid tests along the way, and no contact beyond the ship."

Regardless of the extra layers that these precautions added, Morse realized a dream come true with this very special







trip; an excursion which had been on his "list" since the first days of cruise itineraries going there.

"I've been all over the world," Morse said, "but Antarctica was the most beautiful place I've ever been. Photos and words can only begin to convey Antarctica's majesty and beauty."

And what majesty these photos display!

We lived on Lake George, NY, for four years after retiring from our jobs at IBM in the Poughkeepsie, NY area. We had spent weekends and summers there for several years before that, but never year-round. The first time my husband went up to our house in the winter, I was not able to go so he took pictures for me. They were beautiful – stark black and grey trees against the snow-covered ground. I asked him why he took black and white pictures and didn't take colored pictures... his reply was "those are colored pictures." That's how we discovered the colorless, cold days of winter in Lake George.

The lake was two miles across to the other shore from our house and it would freeze over most winters so thick that you could ride a snowmobile across it. The ice fishermen would drive their pickup trucks out on the ice and erected ice houses so they could drill holes and fish through the ice. There was a law that said all ice houses had to be off the lake on March 15 because the ice would start to melt and thaw, but on March 16 we saw about 42 pickup trucks on the ice! Apparently, the law didn't mention trucks. The waters of Lake George were pristine, so a sunken pickup truck would have been a very bad thing. Fortunately, we never saw one.


When the ice thawed it made a great ringing noise, like a gong under water. As soon as there was a little open water the water birds would start arriving... beautiful loons, hundreds of snow geese, many species of ducks. They would rest on the ice around the open water for a few days and then some would fly off to areas farther north. I wish we had pictures of them.

There was one winter when the lake didn't freeze over completely and the captain and crew of the summer tourist steamboat, the Mohican, brought the boat up the lake on February 8th – just because they could! We went out on the porch and waved at them. They blew the big, booming, boat horn in reply.

The snow was very deep in the woods around us. I remember one March it snowed 10 inches every week for three weeks! We tried some snow shoeing and some cross-country skiing, but it was just too cold and windy. I mostly stayed in and quilted. We spent a fortune having the driveway plowed so we could get in and out, if necessary.

So, now you know why SNOW is a four-letter word to us and why we now live in South Carolina. Joel's story is we tied a snow shovel to the front of our car and drove until someone ask us what it was. I now call the hottest, most humid days of summer, my "snow days" and I enjoy staying inside with my quilting.

We are grateful for this beautiful place – Dataw Island.

Sales Report

Property Lines: By the Numbers

- In November, 2021, we had 15 closings, comprising 9 homes and 6 lots. This brings us to a year to date total of 160 closings, which is about 30% MORE closings that we had at this time in 2020, which itself was a record-setting year.
- The homes sold in November had a median value of \$550,000 and an average of \$559,444. Year to date, the median price of homes sold was \$395,000 up \$34,210 from \$360,790 at this time last year.
- Currently there are 10 homes on the market (1 of which is listed as under contract), and 31 lots. At this time last year there were 34 homes on the market and 56 lots.
- November, 2021, saw 7074 unique visitors to the public-facing website, up 5% from last November. New users are up 9% from 5634 to 6132.
- Year to date, the website has seen 81,402 unique visitors, down 3% from 87,737 at this time last year. New users were also down 3%, and average session duration is up 4% to 3 minutes; anything over 2 minutes is considered excellent.

These days, I am often asked if we need to keep marketing when our inventory is running so low. For a more comprehensive answer, I recommend the Marketing article on page 19 of Dateline; to recap:

- It is important that we continue to fill the "pipeline" with leads, so when current owners are ready to sell there are buyers and hopefully strong prices
- It is equally importat to continue to build brand awareness (which is the first step to any sale)

Remember, many buyers in our market begin their research 2-5 years prior to buying, so many of today's prospects are future buyers. The continued investments in keeping our facilities updated and our community top-of-mind are paramount to our relevance now and in the future.

Although it is true that the number of homes on the market at a given moment is very low, we are selling WAY more homes and lots than we ever had in the past. In other words, we should count our successes (record-breaking sales, increased prices, turning vacant lots into improved properties) and continue the momentum rather than risking taking a major backslide by halting our initiatives.

As the market evolves, we will be thankful for the benefits of having a healthy pipeline of buyers.

Once again Dataw Island has proven itself to be incredibly generous to those in need. During a recent drive to support Afghan refugees, Dataw members provided about 2000 pounds of hygiene products and cleaning supplies as well as gift cards and checks totaling around \$3000. resettlement process and the help that is needed.

With the fall of Afghanistan, some 55,600 Afghans escaped by airlift and suddenly became refugees living in barracks at U.S. military bases across the country and overseas. Most are individuals or family members who supported our troops and development efforts. They have been

extensively screened and fully vaccinated, and are being vetted at military bases like Fort McCoy, before being resettled in local communities. Over 400 refugees will find new homes in SC in the coming months, primarily around Columbia, Greenville, and Charleston.

Since the presentation, many have asked how to become more involved in assisting in their resettlement process. Lutheran Services Carolinas, a faith-based

non-profit, is the government contracted provider for our area. They seek volunteers in many areas, from providing mentorship and job support to housing and transport. There is also the potential for a Dataw group to be part of a "Circle of Welcome," for refugees arriving in Charleston. Lutheran Services will group 8-14 people who commit to volunteering with a family for a six- or twelve-month period. 


Bluffton Christmas Parade December 4, 10 am


